

Anthroposophy Studies on Campus 2023|2024

The Anthroposophy Studies on Campus is aimed at anyone looking for an understanding of Rudolf Steiner's work and how Anthroposophy relates to different fields. The program features lessons focused on the study of Rudolf Steiner's writings, thematic weekly seminars, artistic courses, and ongoing nature observation classes. There are no requirements for this course, apart from a fair knowledge of the English language.

About the program

This is a three-terms program. Each term is designed around a theme and focuses on the study of a particular book. The first term starts every October. Participants can choose to enrol for the entire academic year or attend each term separately.

- Autumn Term** - Orientation
 2 October - 15 December 2023
 Book: Theosophy, Rudolf Steiner
- Winter Term** - Knowledge, ethics, responsibility
 8 January - 22 March 2024
 Book: The Philosophy of Freedom, Rudolf Steiner
- Spring Term** - Praxis
 8 April - 21 June 2024
 Book: The Threshold of the Spiritual World, Rudolf Steiner

Course Components

- Morning Lessons**
 The program aims to introduce students to the core of Rudolf Steiner's work in daily morning lessons focused on the study of texts and open discussions.
- Art Courses & Nature Observation**
 Painting, drawing, sculpting and Eurythmy classes, as well as the Nature Observation outings, enrich the thought process that takes place in the classroom.
